5.8 Total Fire Ban and Harvest and Vehicle Movement Bans Summary fact sheet

5.8.1 Summary of Outline of Process Used to Declare TFB (below)

A Total Fire Ban (TFB) is imposed as a risk-based prevention measure to restrict activities and reduce the likelihood of ignition in bushland/vegetation and increase awareness in the wider community on the day the ban is declared. A TFB may be declared when fires are most likely to threaten lives and property due to adverse weather conditions or when widespread fires are stretching firefighting resources.

During adverse fire weather, Bush Fire Control Officers may be required to issue a harvest and vehicle movement ban (HVMB). Where a TFB is declared, under regulation 24C of the *Bush Fires Act 1954*, a Bush Fire Control Officer must impose an HVMB when the Fire Behaviour Index (FBI) issued by the Bureau of Meteorology reaches 40. This will result in banning all agricultural and off-road activities involving engines, vehicles, plant, equipment or machinery, when they are of the opinion the activity is likely to cause a fire or would be conducive to the spread of a bush fire (when the HVMB is issued under r.24C, exemptions apply for urgent works by an essential service provider i.e. electricity services).

5.8.2 <u>Summary of Activities Prohibited When TFB Imposed – see also DFES web page</u>

In accordance with Section 22B of the *Bush Fires Act 1954*, the declaration of a TFB prohibits persons from lighting or maintaining fires in the open air or carrying out an activity in the open air that causes or is likely to cause a fire.

It is an offence for a person in the open air to use solid fuel for the purpose of cooking or to carry out any process or operation that is likely to create a bushfire danger, eg incinerating, welding, grinding, soldering or gas cutting. Gas appliances, whereby the flame is encapsulated by the appliance (as is the case in most BBQs), are not prohibited from use during a TFB.

During a TFB regulation 24A of the *Bush Fires Regulations 1954* prohibits the use or operation of any engine, vehicle, plant, equipment or machinery (*where it is activated by an internal combustion engine*) on land on which there is bush, or which is under crop, pasture or stubble. This prohibition does not apply if the activity is being carried out to prevent the risk to life or livestock, as long as all reasonable precautions are taken to prevent a bushfire. The prohibition also does not apply if the off-road activity is part of urgent works carried out by an essential service provider for the provision, restoration, or maintenance of an essential service (i.e. Western Power driving off-road to carry out fault finding activities).

Any place from which sparks or embers could escape. Undercover areas such as patios, pergolas and huts that are open or partially open to the weather are deemed to be in the open air. Any place that is not fully enclosed by a building or structure.

5.8.3 Harvest Vehicle Movement Ban

Under S38A of Bushfires Act 1954 HVMB can only be issued during restricted and prohibited season.

5.8.4 Roadworks and TFB

Roadworks are permissible during TFB if carried out on behalf of, or by, public authority, provided catastrophic FDR is not forecast.

If no Catastrophic FDR forecast ground within 5m of operating machinery must be cleared of flammable material.

When not in use machinery must be parked up in cleared area. If Catastrophic FDR forecast then 'urgent road works' can still be undertaken. (Scanned attachments were provided with the Agenda outlining specific details and requirements and exact wording of regulations.)

CBFCO report BFAC October 14th 2024

In September Mick had to spend Father's day morning with the truck putting out a campfire at the Jacup truckstop. Lucky he had Kade with him.

Last Monday while myself and 14 others were learning the AIIMS 2017 course, I had a 000 call during the lunchbreak-I thought-this will be a test, part of the course but no, a truck was on fire on Devils Creek Rd so a crew went to that one and it was handled pretty quickly. Thank you to the 7 people who completed the course from our shire

The CESM position has been vacated and we look forward to having a new CESM as a stand alone for our shire soon. Charmaine has taken that role until it is filled.


Truck servicing is in progress now

Parks and Wildlife Service - Albany District Report: Jerramungup BFAC Meeting 16th September 2024

Fire Season Preparedness:

DBCA are currently undertaking preparations for the bushfire season ahead which is coming out of a warmer and drier Autumn, Winter. We are currently at moderate staffing capacity. Ranger at SRNP has retired, and the process is underway for selection and appointment of a new ranger for the park. We will have 4 new Conservation Employees joining the ranks within the next few weeks.

Government Investment in Capacity:

The State Government investment into fire capability is underway. The new Conservation Employees have been selected and are commencing in the near future. The new heavy duty "gang truck" fire appliance, a D6 bulldozer, a low loader and prime mover are all on order and under construction. Expected time of arrival will be later next year.

Projects Planned/Completed:

A number of projects have been underway or are planned within Fitzgerald River National Park. Last year we completed approximately 250km of firebreak spraying, 15 km of firebreak upgrades. Planned for this summer is 40km of firebreak upgrade on the northern boundary of the Park, 100 km of firebreak spraying and approximately 30km of grading north of Bremer Bay..

Prescribed Burning:

There are a number burns planned for next autumn/winter. Considerations were made in the previous Autumn to undertake burning within these areas, however unfortunately the timeframe between the bush being drought-ridden and too dry to being saturated was insufficient for any operation to be successfully undertaken. Some of these were subject to the outcomes of permits to take flora and all were subject to permits to take fauna.

Soil Dryness and Ecosystem Health:

Rainfall across the Albany District is down on last year, increasing more so the further east of Albany you go. After an already dry year, this is raising concerns for the ongoing drought effects on the landscape, as well as the inherent bushfire risk that brings. DBCA are continuing to monitor the situation.

Staff Changes

After almost 20 years as a District Fire Coordinator, Vince Hilder will be taking up a position as Regional Operations Officer – Work Health and Safety.
